



Report of the President



The year 2025 marked the starting point of a new Olympic Cycle. A new code of Points brought out great new routines that were trialed and tested, and approved by our loyal European Gymnastics fans.

Our competition season started in April in Luxembourg with the European Age Group Competitions and the European Championships in Acrobatic Gymnastics. During these events, we witnessed the progress and growth of this discipline. For the first time, Türkiye took part while it was another first for Denmark competing in the senior ranks, with not one but two units.

Artistic gymnasts were excited to perform at the European Championships held within the framework of the International German Gymnastics Festival 'Das Turnfest' in Leipzig. One of the highlights was the launch of the Mixed Team Final. Tested at the last two editions of the European Youth Olympic Festival, the format was revised by our Technical Committees to match the expectations of an international TV audience. The synergy between recreational and competitive gymnastics came to a spectacular end at the Stadion Gala where our Champions were honoured in front of 40,000 enthusiastic spectators.

In May, Baku (AZE) hosted the second edition of the innovative European Cup in Rhythmic Gymnastics and handed it over to Burgas. The European Cup continued to offer exciting 'Cross Battles' where gymnasts go head-to-head in knock-out stages. Our aim is to expand this idea to other disciplines in the future.

The Estonian capital Tallinn hosted the Rhythmic Gymnastics Europeans for the first time. The representation of so many different countries in the finals and on the podium was very impressive.

At the European Youth Olympic Festival in Osijek (CRO) the level of skills on display and the variety of nations making it into the finals and onto the podium showed that Artistic Gymnastics continues to grow in our continent.

A remarkable first took place in Azerbaijan as well. It hosted the European Championships for the first time in its region Ganja. The ancient city opened its doors to Aerobic gymnasts and was also the first to showcase the Under 15 category, in addition to the junior and senior competitions.

The work of our organisers is essential in the successful delivery of our events. They are supported by the European Gymnastics Team and Technical Committees to ensure the quality of the competitions leave our spectators content and entertained, be it at the venue or online.

All our competitions were streamed online on a renewed and improved livestream platform, powered by Staylive, with entertaining commentary and special TV graphics in close cooperation with our global partner SmartScoring. A lot of work is done to engage our spectators, through means of social media, active mascot entertainment, announcements, and consistent competition visuals. We are also grateful to our partner SmartScoring for their contributions in inspiring and rewarding our athletes with its 'Shooting Star Award'.

We have continued our progress in the alignment between the TV production, the venue announcements and sports presentation, putting the athletes well and truly in the spotlight. Our mascot Luigi provided entertainment to both the audience and the gymnasts, showing a fun aspect of high-level competitions.

In September, we had an important meeting at our headquarters in Lausanne with the TeamGym apparatus suppliers in Europe. With the aim of discussing current developments in the sport and exploring future perspectives for TeamGym, the topics on hand included the development of TeamGym, from overall participation and competitions to feedback on current TeamGym apparatus and the discussion of possible improvements from suppliers, gymnasts and the wider TeamGym community. This was very important for the future growth and progress of this discipline.

The accomplishments of our athletes have certainly gone beyond the boundaries of continental competitions. Our athletes confidently performed at the World University Games uniting student-athletes from all over the world in many different sports, including Artistic and Rhythmic Gymnastics.

The World Games in Chengdu turned out to be quite successful for our athletes. This edition included Acrobatic Gymnastics, Aerobic Gymnastics, Trampoline Gymnastics represented by Synchro, Tumbling and Double-Mini Trampoline, and Parkour. With titles for Portugal, Belgium, Great Britain, Ukraine, Spain, Israel, Hungary, Sweden and Switzerland, 18 European countries made it onto the podium.

European athletes enlightened the World Championships in Rhythmic Gymnastics in Rio de Janeiro (BRA), in Artistic Gymnastics in Jakarta (INA) and in Trampoline Gymnastics in Pamplona (ESP) where their excellence performances mesmerised the audiences.

The main purpose of our Meetings of the Presidential Board and Executive Committee was to structure our work in a way to bear its fruits in the years to come. Our Strategy 2030 is based on 4 important pillars: Events, Knowledge & Safeguarding, Marketing & Communication and Organisation & Finance, and comprises projects, the implementation of which were also a part of our meetings' agenda. It's now in the hands of the new Executive Committee to build on these ideas and continue the progress already achieved.

Following our Executive Committee meeting in October, we invited all our member federations to Zurich (SUI) for a members forum. I was pleased to see that 35 European

Gymnastics federations joined us on site where we presented an updated proposal for a governance restructure, based on detailed feedback received in the previous federations workshop held in March. On the second day of the members forum, key principles for a European Gymnastics commercial strategy as well as the events strategy were presented and discussed. This input is essential for us to advance with the implementation of these projects and will offer a solid framework to the next Executive Committee for the 2026 – 2029 Cycle.

I attended the European Olympic Committees (EOC) electoral Congress in the German city of Frankfurt. One of the main topics of the Agenda was the next edition of the European Games. And, I'm proud to announce that gymnastics will be a part of it once again. Our aim is to include the same 6 disciplines as in the inaugural European Games in Baku (2015) and Minsk (2019): Men's and Women's Artistic, Rhythmic, Trampoline, Acrobatic and Aerobic Gymnastics. Within the framework of these meetings, it was a pleasure for me to connect with my European counterparts and discuss vision, strategy and events.

Another year is gone. A year of successful events, hard work, great results, and crucial decisions. One of the important decisions made for the future development of Gymnastics, was my election to the Presidency of European Gymnastics for the third term.

I appreciate your trust and respect for the work we are doing together. As everything rapidly changes nowadays, including ourselves, European Gymnastics has also changed a lot. All the changes and improvements were made in close cooperation with each of you – the people committed to Gymnastics and doing a lot for its future.

Now, it's time to continue our joint work with the re-elected members of the European Gymnastics authorities as we warmly welcome the new ones, who I am sure will bring fresh breath to our big team.

Good luck to all of us in 2026!



Report of the Director



The year 2026 begins and European Gymnastics enters a new 4-year cycle. The past twelve months passed quickly, filled with dynamic developments and memorable moments for European Gymnastics.

As it is tradition, the year 2025 opened with an Executive Committee meeting in Lausanne. Shortly after, a workshop with 27 member federations took place in Zürich in March to discuss a governance re-structure proposal as part of the European Gymnastics strategy 2024 - 2030. A second members forum in Zürich followed in October to continue discussions on the same topic, as well as for presentations on key areas for a commercial strategy and an events strategy of European Gymnastics. Valuable feedback from member federations was received during these meetings. It will be crucial for European Gymnastics, led by the newly elected Executive Committee, to continue the way of these strategic developments to make European Gymnastics a fit-for-purpose organisation for the future.

The competition season opened in January with further editions of online competitions as offer for gymnasts to prepare for the major events of the season. The first on-site event took place in April in Luxembourg with the European Championships and Age Group Competitions in Acrobatic Gymnastics. It has been a pleasure to see that the team from the small Luxembourg Gymnastics Federation delivered another successful European event after TeamGym in 2022.

A busy season followed in May and June with two Rhythmic European Cups as well as European Championships in Artistic Gymnastics and Rhythmic Gymnastics taking place one after another. At the European Cups in Baku (AZE) and Burgas (BUL), the successful Cross Battles format now also included the groups. The European Championships in Artistic Gymnastics in Leipzig (GER) took place in a unique atmosphere in the middle of the German Gymnastics Festival 'Das Turnfest' and its 80,000 participants. The week after in early June, butterflies were the symbol in the most beautiful arena for the European Championships in Rhythmic Gymnastics in Tallinn (EST). My thanks go to the Organising Committees of Azerbaijan, Bulgaria, Germany and Estonia for delivering these great events.

As in every odd year, the summer was reserved for junior gymnasts in artistic gymnastics who competed at the European Youth Olympic Festival in Osijek (CRO). While the main event of EYOF took place in Skopje (MKD), European Gymnastics is grateful for the support of the Croatian Gymnastics Federation and its local organising team from Osijek for taking over the organisation of the gymnastics competitions. A record number of participating teams was seen in the women's competitions.

The European Gymnastics competition season ended in November in Ganja (AZE) with the European Championships in Aerobic Gymnastics. It was a double premiere with hosting a European Gymnastics event for the first time in the city of Ganja and with the 1st edition of European Under 15 Championships in this discipline. With the experienced and professional support of the team from the Azerbaijan Gymnastics Federation both premiers were managed successfully!

While many spectators followed the Championships in the venues all over Europe, also the livestream on gymtv.online, in cooperation with SmartScoring, continued to grow in popularity in 2025 with an increased offer of days with expert commentary. And the fanbase of the popular European Gymnastics mascot Luigi increased throughout the year.



Back to the usual 2-year rhythm, the year ended with the 2025 European Gymnastics Congress in Prague (CZE). I express my gratitude to the team from the Czech Gymnastics Federation who successfully managed the organisation of the electoral assembly with many participants. While everyone's focus was on the elections on the second day, also an update on the European Gymnastics strategy was part of the programme as well as an interesting side event with a presentation on athletes' storytelling, giving valuable input to the member federations for their own work.


Beyond the Congress and the major championships, numerous educational activities initiated by the European Gymnastics Technical Committees took place across all disciplines in both offline and online formats throughout the year. The season of educational events ended with the CEO Symposium on the day after the European Gymnastics Congress in Prague. Despite the long General Assembly days before, representatives of 20 federations joined for an interesting Crisis Management workshop. Ideas for future symposiums are being collected from the feedback of participants, and this format will certainly continue.

My gratitude goes to the European Gymnastics staff for their continued dedication and hard work, and to our partners SmartScoring, EBU, Spieth, Gymnova, Eurotramp, Elevien and FB-Curves, who, beyond their material contribution, actively help to shape the development of gymnastics in Europe through their ideas and proposals. As we end the year of an electoral congress, my thanks go to the authorities who will end their mandate on December 31st, and I am looking forward to the cooperation with the re-elected and new representatives from 2026 onward.

Gymnast of the Year 2024

For this edition of the European 'Gymnast of the Year' elections, the Executive Committee chose the following 5 categories: Male, Female, Team, Outstanding Performance and Coach.

Nominations for the long list were made by our Technical Committees, Authorities, staff, and the 50 European member Federations. A selection committee featuring European Gymnastics Vice-President Michel Boutard, Executive Committee members Paolo Frising, Natalja Inno and Solveig Jonsdottir, General Director Lisa Worthmann and Head of Media Tina Gerets, had the difficult task to choose 5 nominees in each category.

After 6 intense days of voting, the winners were announced ...





Male Gymnast of the Year

Marios Georgiou (CYP) – Men's Artistic Gymnastics

✓ Votes: **26,260 (50.6%)**

Putting all his efforts into securing that last Olympic qualifying ticket at the European Championships in Rimini, Marios Georgiou went even further: he became the first Cypriot gymnast to clinch the European all-around title! He added three more medals that week: silver on parallel bars and bronze on pommel horse and horizontal bar. The Paris 2024 Olympic Games marked his third Olympic Games, again a first for a Cypriot gymnast, and he also became the first to reach an individual final, securing the sixth place on horizontal bar. He is a true inspiration for young athletes!

Female Gymnast of the Year

Valentina Georgieva (BUL) – Women's Artistic Gymnastics

✓ Votes: **92,767 (53.5%)**

Not even two years after a serious knee injury that required major surgery, Valentina Georgieva excelled in 2024. At the Europeans in Rimini, she vaulted to silver, the first Bulgarian medal on this apparatus since 1989. At the Paris Olympics, she qualified to the vault final, on her 18th birthday. In the final, she was the only European gymnast, and she finished 5th. Valentina Georgieva subsequently received many honours: the President of the Republic of Bulgaria bestowed upon her a plaque for her outstanding achievements, and she was chosen as Bulgaria's 'Best Young Athlete' by the sports journalists of Bulgaria, and won two Sports Icarus Awards: 'Breakthrough in World Sport' and 'Most Talented Athlete of Bulgaria'.



Team of the Year

Senior Men's Team (DEN) – TeamGym

✓ Votes: **26,260 (50.6%)**

At the European Championships in TeamGym, the Danish senior men's team delivered an outstanding performance, claiming victory with a significant margin. This solidified their reputation as one of the most dominant teams in the sport, remaining undefeated in all their appearances over the years: 7 out of 7 championship titles (2010, 2012, 2014, 2016, 2018, 2020 and 2024). This showcases unparalleled consistency and excellence. Their routines featured unprecedented difficulty that set a new standard. This team's dedication, discipline, and ability to push the boundaries of gymnastics make them a true inspiration.



Outstanding Performance

Top Acro Gym (POR) – Gymnastics for All

✓ Votes: 128,280 (46.5%)

Year after year, Top Acro Gym seeks to develop an own identity, having already established some brand elements like the 'human wave'. At the 2024 edition of the European Gym for Life Challenge, they received the Gold Award plus the special 'Wow Factor' prize. All that despite a rocky road to Bodo: 39 members of the group fell victim to a scam, paying for fake airline tickets. Heaven and earth were moved, involving lengthy flight plans, but luckily the group managed to arrive in Bodo in the early hours of the competition day and showcase their usual high quality. Resilience and unity prevailed among the group, the club, and all the parents!



Coach of the Year

Laurent Guelzec (SUI) – Men's Artistic Gymnastics

✓ Votes: 18,213 (79.8%)

As the Head coach of the Swiss men's artistic team, Laurent Guelzec formed the base for the outstanding results achieved at the European Championships in Rimini and the Olympic Games in Paris. His experience is essential in the successful transitioning from the junior to the senior level.

European Age Group Competitions in Acrobatic Gymnastics

10 – 13 April 2025

Luxembourg



Held for the first time in the city of Luxembourg, 24 countries were represented by 383 gymnasts at the European Age Group Competitions in Acrobatic Gymnastics, from 10 to 13 April 2025 in the beautiful D'Coque Arena. The future stars of ACRO competed in one of the two age groups: Pre Youth (11 – 16) or Youth (12 – 18). During two days of qualification rounds, units battled for their place in the finals, and a potential medal.





Bulgarian brilliance

Eight Pre Youth Mixed Pairs gave it their all during their Balance routine to battle for the medals. With a great score of 27.500, the Bulgarian duo Simona Ivanova and Hasan Ismail created a gap of 6 tenths over their nearest rivals Lourenco Cartaxo and Noa Rodrigues (POR), giving the vocal Bulgarian fans exactly what they came for: a European title for this talented duo!



Israel impresses

ACRO powerhouse Israel had a fabulous outing, earning a grand total of 5 European titles, easily topping the medal table! Their success started in the first final where Pre Youth Men's Pairs Yonatan Shechner and Jonathan Weitzman Dach amassed a total score of 26.900 for their dynamic exercise and the first gold medal for their nation. On the second day of finals, Gal Harel and Gilad Shiner continued the winning way as this Youth Men's Pair showcased an incredible combined routine to cruise to victory over Spain's

Eric Sales and Borja Soriano. The highest score of that day came courtesy of Israel's Youth Women's Group Ofek Biran, Vanessa Babel and Tom Levy Aizner. With a 1.1 difficulty and 18.300 execution score, this trio amassed a total of 28.300 for the European title. To top it all off, Israeli gymnasts won gold in both remaining Pre Youth finals, with Ella Ben Zvi and Nurit Luria crowned in the Women's Pairs and Michelle Obolencev, Tzuf Asor and Shachar Vardi in the Women's Groups.



British boost

The British national anthem 'God save the King' filled the arena for the spectacular performance of Great Britain's Men's Group featuring Lucas Mcdermott, Henry Sharman, Joseph Scotney and Morris Hyde. With the highest scores across the board, the British lads posted a 27.720 to clinch the Youth title!

Adding to that collection



In first place going into the junior women's pairs all-around final, Abi Read and Evie Jagers made no doubt about it, they were the ones to beat. And no one even came close! The British duo had almost half a point advantage over nearest rivals. In the dynamic final, a score of 28.010 easily secured their second title. Joining the British celebrations, 2023 Pre Youth European Age Group Champions Gemma Biddle, Alexis Biddle and Sophie Noyce clinched the junior all-around and dynamic titles.



Israeli dominance

Topping the medal table with no less than 23 medals, including 11 European titles, ACRO powerhouse Israel once again showed its worth. A world class team put on a genuine display for the audience in Luxembourg. Highlighted on the senior level by the all-around titles won by mixed pair Amy Refaeli and Yonatan Fridman and the men's group featuring Or Abraham, Lior Borodin, Rotem Amihai and Tomer Offir who also claimed gold for a truly spectacular dynamic routine, the Israeli delegation showed that the up-and-coming generation is equally strong, claiming no less than 8 junior titles. 

Portuguese prowess

Their confidence boosted after clinching the junior all-around victory, Tomas Martinho, Jorge Silva, Gabriel Vilela and Joao Samico displayed a fun, energetic and crowd-pleasing dynamic routine for their second gold medal in as many days for Portugal. The expressiveness and spectacular skills during the routine were accompanied by cheers of pure delight when the guys saw their final score. Another golden moment came as Miguel Lopes and Goncalo Parreira held their own in the men's pairs dynamic, earning the title with a score of 27.890. And under loud applause of the enthusiastic crowd, Alicia Santos, Leonor Carreira and Ema Fernandes earned the only hattrick of the senior field!



Proudly Ukrainian

The Ukrainian delegation returned home with a grand total of 13 medals, three of which were golden. Their senior mixed pair Ivan Labunets and Yevfrosyniia Kryvytska displayed by far the most difficult balance routine, earning 28.950 and the European title for an elegant and passionate performance. The Ukrainian anthem was heard twice for senior women's pair Anhelina Cherniavska and Ruzanna Vecheruk. First, the fabulous duo topped the all-around standings. Then, they performed a fabulous -and difficult- dynamic routine for yet another European crown.



Welcome Denmark

The Scandinavian country Denmark made its first appearance on the senior level in Luxembourg, with not one but two women's groups! It's an honour to welcome Klara Adamsen, Signe Henningsen, Mille Jensen, Emilie Mueller, Signe Poerksen and Frida Stentebjerg-Milandt to the floor, and we hope to see more Danish representation in future events.



The Shooting star award goes to ...

At just 18 years old, Norina Froehlich (SUI) already made waves on the world stage. Last year, she made history as the first athlete from Switzerland to reach a final at the Acro World Championships. A rocky path led her there: in 2021 Norina had to leave the cantonal training centre due to the travel time and lack of compatibility with school and work. She actually left acrobatics completely. In 2022, by chance, a cantonal programme for acrobatic gymnastics was created in her hometown St. Gallen and Norina was invited to join. In 2023, she was set to compete at the European Championships, but a last-minute injury to her partner meant she had to sit out. Instead of letting the setback define her, she used it as fuel to come back stronger. For the past three years, Norina has balanced an elite training schedule with a demanding apprenticeship—juggling work, study, and high-performance sport with unshakable commitment and drive. Since August she is officially working as a dental practice assistant, managing a 35-hour workweek plus 25 hours of training. A story of resilience, grit, and passion, Norina is a true role model for young athletes, a symbol of what dedication and heart can achieve.

For Aghasif Rahimov (AZE) it all started at the European Age Group Competitions in Germany back in 2015, where he competed alongside Nurjan Jabbarli in the Mixed Pair category, earning a bronze medal. Since then, Rahimov participated in each edition of the European Age Group Competitions / Europeans, except in 2019 when he was doing his military service. Making a strong comeback in 2021 with a new partner, Raziya Seyidli, the pair has gone from strength to strength, culminating in triple victory at the previous Europeans in Varna (BUL), a remarkable feat. Now competing in his fifth and final European Championships, he is set to conclude his athletic career after the upcoming World Games. A true team player, Rahimov is an inspiration in the Azerbaijani acro community. He provides tremendous support to his teammates, celebrating their victories, offering advice and a helping hand when needed. In fact, he's back training with good friends Seymur Jafarov and Abdulla Al-Mashaykhi since their comeback to form part of Azerbaijan's first men's group. And not just in acro Rahimov is an encouraging figure: alongside his busy training and competition schedule, he's committed to coaching a great variety of skills to kids in Gymnastics for All.

2025 European Championships in Artistic Gymnastics

26 – 31 May 2025

Leipzig



The German city of Leipzig hosted the 2025 edition of the European Championships in Artistic Gymnastics, organised in the framework of the German Gymnastics Festival 'Das Turnfest', which features 60,000 participants. These Europeans welcomed 37 participating national federations, represented by a grand total of 292 gymnasts, 131 women and 161 men.



Mixed Team Final debut

A historic moment in Leipzig as the Mixed Team Final made its European Championships debut. After testing at the European Youth Olympic Festival, this format was introduced at a major international event for the very first time, gearing up to its Olympic introduction at LA28.

Over 4 rounds the medal winners were decided. In round one, 16 teams of one female and one male athlete performed one routine each on the apparatus of their choice. The men could choose from floor, parallel bars and high bar, and the women between vault, beam and floor. The combined scores determined the eight teams advancing to round two where they competed another routine, on a different apparatus. Then, the top four had to compete on the remaining apparatus. Teams ranked 3 and 4 faced each other in the bronze medal match, while the top two went head-to-head for gold. Strategic thinking at its finest!

To the delight of the crowd, the German duo of Timo Eder and Karina Schoenmaier made it into the gold medal fight. They were up against the British pair Jake Jarman and Ruby Evans. Both men competed on high bar, while the women battled on beam. Germany went first, with Eder posting a

13.333. Schoenmaier's 12.233 on beam made their total score of 25.566. The Brits knew exactly what they needed and went hard. Jarman matched Eder's score on high bar, putting the pressure on the shoulders of Evans. Both teams sat side by side eagerly awaiting that final score. And when it flashed, the party erupted: 12.133 for Evans for a total score of 25.466, just one tenth less than their rivals. Germany became the first ever European Mixed Team Champion!

Top qualifiers Italy battled for bronze against France. Defending European Champion Manila Esposito showed her strength on beam yet again, posting a fabulous 14.266 while Lorenzo Minh Casali added a 13.700 on parallel bars, outscoring Morgane Ossysek-Reimer and Anthony Mansard for the bronze.

The Beauty of Barbosu

Romania's Ana Barbosu tasted Olympic success and came back for more! In the all-around final, the former junior European Champion posted the highest score on floor, a 13.700, a reward for a dynamic routine that put her back on the podium after problems on beam nearly took her out of contention. Bronze for Barbosu and a Romanian return to the podium, 12 years after Larisa Iordache's silver medal. A last-minute replacement in the bars final, Ana Barbosu continued on her medal winning path, adding another bronze medal while she earned the silver on beam. Saving her very best till last, Barbosu cruised through her floor routine with her usual style and grace, clinching the gold medal. A maiden European title on the senior level to complement her many junior accomplishments!

Whitehouse for the triple

Going into the floor final as the defending European Champion from both 2023 and 2024, Great Britain's Luke Whitehouse opened his quest for a triple with a triple back somersault. Showing incredible difficulty and controlling all his moves well, Whitehouse posted a 14.500. Teammate Harry Hepworth matched in difficulty but lost a little over a tenth in execution. A British one-two on floor, both gymnasts from the same club in Leeds even! And Whitehouse achieves the triple. The first gymnast to achieve three consecutive titles since Italy's Franco Menichelli in the sixties.

Schoenmaier strikes again

In a closely contended vault final, Germany's Karina Schoenmaier led the pack with two great vaults. Only 2024 European silver medallist Valentina Georgieva could hold the German from clinching a second European title this week. Georgieva showed off her trademark style, finishing a mere 0.083 behind Schoenmaier. Gold on vault returned to Germany, last won by the legendary Oksana Chusovitina back in 2008.

Under the watchful eyes of more than 5000 spectators, defending Champion Manila Esposito headed into the all-around final as the top qualifier. And the clear favourite was rock solid! Starting with a nice vault and a decent bars routine, Esposito led at the halfway stage, with her two strongest apparatuses still to come. An exquisite beam routine earned her the top score of this final: 14.333. Sealing the deal on floor, Esposito enjoyed her time in the spotlight, quietly and confidently defending her all-around title for her second gold of the week. Later on, she added the silver on floor to her already impressive collection.

Defending Champions Italy lined up a fascinating mix of experience courtesy of Alice D'Amato and Manila Esposito, blended with youthful energy by Giulia Perotti, Emma Fioravanti and Sofia Tonelli. With the highest scores on beam and floor and solid results on vault and bars, the Italians secured the top spot, showing the world that they are ready to tackle this new Olympic cycle in the same fashion as they finished the previous one. Italy is the Champion of Europe yet again!

Qualified in fifth place to the all-around final, Alba Petisco showed her incredible talent, taking the lead after rotation one courtesy of her clean vault. The experienced Spaniard stayed focused on the job at hand, performing consistently on bars and beam. Petisco shone on floor where she showcased her skills and creativity in a delightful floor routine. With a total score of 53.265, Petisco clinched the silver medal. History written as this is Spain's first ever medal! More success came on floor where Petisco earned the bronze.

Adem Asil does it again!

Heading into the all-around final looking to improve on his qualification performances, Türkiye's Adem Asil started off solidly on floor and pommel horse. His strongest apparatus came next. On rings, Asil obtained a 14.766, the highest score of the day. On vault, he followed suit with impressive height for 14.300, taking the lead. Going into the last rotation with a mere 3 tenths advantage, Asil knew exactly what was going on and what he needed to do on horizontal bar. Calm and composed, the 26-year-old aced his routine for a total score of 82.398. An improvement by over 2 points compared to qualifications, Adem Asil is back again on top of Europe. His second European All-Around title is a fact. And it tastes every bit as sweet as the first one won in front of a home crowd in Antalya two years ago.

Double gold on rings

In a nail-biting rings final, we witnessed the top 6 gymnasts finish within less than a tenth of a point of each other. Tense to the very last moment, 7-time European Champion Eleftherios Petrounias added another title to his already record-holding achievements. But not just like that! Petrounias tied with Türkiye's Adem Asil. Both gymnasts had exactly the same score, ending in a double gold medal being awarded! Not quite the first time as it was done last in 2014, but an unusual case that brings pleasure to the fans worldwide.

Junior star, senior star

In an exciting pommel horse final, all eyes were on Armenia's specialists making their senior debut: Hamlet Manukyan and Mamikon Khachatryan. Having won three World Cup titles already this year, Manukyan had a tenth less difficulty than his teammate. Compensating with exquisite execution Manukyan posted a total score of 14.766, overtaking Khachatryan for the gold. An Armenian one-two finish to the delight of the entire delegation for the 2027 hosts. Junior European Champion, junior World Champion and now his first senior European title, Hamlet follows into the footsteps of Ireland's Rhys Mcclenaghan.

Derwael's Double

Choosing to compete on bars and beam only at these Europeans, superstar Nina Derwael's decision more than paid off. Posting both the highest difficulty and the highest execution score in the uneven bars final, the 25-year-old Belgian showcased her superb lines, in an exercise that flowed from start to finish. Gold for Derwael, her first major international title since becoming Olympic Champion at the Tokyo Games in 2021, and an impressive third European crown for the Queen of Bars! The next day, the 2019 European Games Champion showed great concentration and control on beam, earning her the top execution mark of this final. Silver in 2018, gold in 2025, Derwael clinched the bars & beam double here in Leipzig.

Back on top

The British men showed up with strong credentials as they fielded a team consisting of Olympic medallists Harry Hepworth and Jake Jarman, double European Champion on floor Luke Whitehouse, EYOF Champion Jonas Rushworth and former junior European Champion and newly crowned British all-around Champion Jamie Lewis. With top scores on rings and vault already under their belt, the British lads went into the last rotation with over a point margin over nearest rival Switzerland. The deal was sealed on floor where they counted a 14.400 for Hepworth, 14.033 for Jarman and 14.266 for Whitehouse. What a way to end the night! Great Britain is the 2025 European Team Champion, regaining the title last won in 2022, also in Germany.

Davtyan reclaims the gold

Defending Champion Jake Jarman aced his incredibly difficult 3,5 twisting vault for a huge 15.200. A step on his Dragulescu brought his average to 14.733. 2023 Champion Artur Davtyan doesn't have the same insane difficulty but makes up that gap with impeccable execution. Sticking both vaults and thus earning 2 tenths in bonus points, the Olympic silver medallist overtook Jarman by a tiny margin. Davtyan returns to the top step of the podium and earns another gold medal for Armenia.

Shining for silver

Showing their potential, Luca and Matteo Giubellini, Florian Langenegger, Ian Raubal and Noe Seifert gave it their all for Switzerland. Solid across all apparatuses, their vaulting talent secured them the silver medal. After winning bronze at their home Europeans in Bern back in 2016, this is just the second time the Swiss made the podium. A historic moment worth celebrating. This time it's silver, what will it be next time?

An extraordinary rebound

18th in the qualification round, Leo Saladino recorded an impressive rebound in the all-around final. The talented Frenchman finished in the top three on floor, rings and parallel bars, before securing a total of 81.430 thanks to his last routine, on pommel horse. Silver for Saladino, still only France's second medal in the all-around ever, after Dmitri Karbanenko's silver back in 1998. What an achievement for the talent from Grasse!

A tight race for the medals on parallel bars ended in a big celebration for the host nation. With the highest difficulty of the field, Nils Dunkel impressed to clinch the gold medal. Teammate Timo Eder excelled in execution, posting the only mark of 9 in this final finishing in third place. Two medals for Germany in one final!

Second last year, the 2020 European Champion hit when it counted, overtaking everyone in execution and matching Toba for the highest difficulty. A second European title on the honours of Tvorogal, his 4th podium finish in the last 6 European Championships!

The Shooting star award goes to ...

Moving to Amsterdam in 2022 for her studies in Artificial Intelligence, Céleste Mordenti started to train there too, evolving to a whole other level than she had attained before in Luxembourg, both as a gymnast and as a person. She became the first Luxembourgish medal winner at a World Challenge Cup in 2024 and repeated this in 2025. By achieving this major success for her and her country, Mordenti is an inspiring gymnast for the next generations in Luxembourg, proving that even a gymnast from a small country can be successful in Gymnastics. Recently Céleste joined the athlete commission of the Luxembourg Olympic Committee and she is always willing to help to defend the rights of the gymnasts in Luxembourg.

Eleftherios Petrounias is well and truly the Greek Lord of the Rings: three-time Olympic medallist, including Rio 2016 Champion, three-time World Champion and a record-holding eight-time European Champion on rings. In an international senior career that spans already almost 15 years, Petrounias faced several setbacks. First, at the 2015 World Championships, Petrounias was fighting for Olympic Qualification while he had just lost his father. The emotions back then were very intense. The gold medal he later won at the Rio 2016 Olympic Games was a victory dedicated to his father. Then, right after the 2018 World Championships a severe pain in the left shoulder needed surgery. A race against the clock ensued, with a specific training schedule in order to regain his strength and return in time for the qualification events before the Tokyo Olympics. With the support of his loyal entourage, his wife Vasiliki Millousi and their two girls, Petrounias continues to shine. Outside of the gym, he's a community leader and member of the Hellenic Gymnastics Federation as athletes' representative.

A historic event in many ways, these European Championships in Rhythmic Gymnastics marked the first time that the Estonian Gymnastics Federation organised an European Gymnastics event. And deliver they most certainly did!

Tallinn's Unibet Arena transformed into a temple devoted to Rhythmic Gymnastics with smiling kids leaping around the halls, chasing our mascot Luigi and taking in the performances of their favourite gymnasts with big eyes.

Already showing splendid form leading up to these Europeans, Taisiia Onofriichuk confirmed her fine shape in Tallinn. Going into the all-around final as the top qualifier, the young Ukrainian star controlled her nerves fabulously, hitting routine after routine. Earning 29.950 for both her 'Thriller' hoop and her 'Everybody dance now' clubs performance, Onofriichuk excelled with ribbon. Performing to the Mary Poppins soundtrack 'supercalifragilisticexpialidocious', Onofriichuk got the spectators on their feet in awe with the variety of skills and artistry presented. Posting the top score with ribbon, Onofriichuk secured the gold medal, the first European all-around title for Ukraine since 1997 when the legendary Olena Vitrychenko won.

Onofriichuk led Ukraine to the silver medal. Israel and Germany tied with a total score

of 270.150. In that case, the country with the highest total execution scores wins, which meant that Israel clinched the bronze medal and Germany finished in fourth place.

In the 5 clubs final, the Ukrainian ladies posted a fabulous 24.650 for their Ghostbusters-themed routine cruising to their second victory of the day.

Brigita Krašovec, the reigning Slovenian national Champion, started rhythmic gymnastics aged 6, following her older sister Barbara into the sport. A master of all trades, Brigita helps her coaches to make new routines, conducts masterclasses for gymnasts and composes her own competition routines, choosing the music and structuring the artistry. Her specialty is ribbon where the music starts with her own voice talking about her feelings for the apparatus. Then, she dances to Gangnam style engaging the public and to national Slovenian polka music. Last year, Brigita went to the USA to teach masterclasses but her love for the sport called her back home to the gym. Aside from being an accomplished Rhythmic gymnast, Krašovec has participated in competitive dance too, clinching the 2022 World title in Modern solo dance, the silver at the 2018 World Show Dance Championships and another silver at the 2021 World Modern & Contemporary Championships. Brigita inspires an entire generation of gymnasts and dancers alike and continues to set an example on and off the carpet..



European Youth Olympic Festival

20 – 26 July 2025

Osijek



The European Youth Olympic Festival celebrated its 18th edition this summer. The biennial event took place in Skopje (MKD) from 20 to 26 July, while Artistic Gymnastics found its home in the experienced hands of the Croatian team in Osijek. 178 junior gymnasts, 79 boys and 99 girls, represented 39 of our member Federations. Known as the stepping stone for junior athletes into the world of multi-sports events, this edition delivered yet again.





Princess Elena

With 5 EYOF titles and one silver medal, the week definitely belonged to Elena Colas. The acclaimed junior gymnast, and multiple medallist at last year's junior Europeans, first led her French team to victory while topping the all-around ranking, courtesy of the highest scores on beam and floor. With an outstanding score of 53.750, the junior European Champion became the European Youth Olympic Festival Champion, following in the footsteps of Germany's Helen Kevric. Partnering with Ruddy Bordelais Maisonnabe, Colas earned the mixed team gold before giving an absolute masterclass on uneven bars where she scored a whopping 14.300, winning the gold with almost 1,5 points advantage. Colas cemented her star status even further as she clinched the gold medal on beam and earned the silver on floor, saying with a smile: „Unbelievable - I'm extremely happy with my performances in Osijek. I didn't expect to win so many medals, but I knew I had the potential."

In the match for bronze, Israel's Ophir Shmueli and Noam Berkovich outscored the Belgian duo Camille Galand and Noe Strypstein by the tiniest margins, a mere 0.034!

An abundance of talent was on display at Ganja's Sports Palace with 20 countries being represented by 379 gymnasts: 208 juniors and 171 U15 participants!






Hungarian future



The Shooting Stars are ...

Zoltán Lócsei is one of the most successful athletes in the history of Hungarian aerobic gymnastics, holding three European, two World and two World Games titles. At the age of 17, the former acrobatic gymnast approached his current coaches Andrea Sinko and Monika Sipos, expressing his desire to try aerobics. He advanced to the national team relatively quickly, and over the past decade has become one of the sport's most accomplished figures. His charismatic personality and kind attitude have laid the foundation for many international friendships and made him a perfect role model for young athletes.

The journey of Anastasiia Kurashvili (UKR) in aerobics began at the age of five, in a small gym where she first discovered what rhythm, strength, and character truly mean. Back then, she didn't yet know that one day she would be called "Grace" for her unique elegance, natural artistry, and ability to turn every movement into a story. Now she is 21. Behind her are years of hard work, thousands of training sessions, and countless victories. Her journey was far from easy. During the war, her hometown came under occupation, forcing her to seek refuge abroad. Yet, as soon as it became possible, she returned home. She never sought the easy way, she simply knew her place was here: with her team, with her country, with Ukraine. Today, Anastasiia continues to train in a border town despite cold gyms, air raid alarms, and power outages. And still, when she steps onto the floor, the world around her fades. There is only music, movement, and the magic she creates through her grace, reaching the very top of her sport. She stands as a symbol of beauty, strength, and unbreakable faith in one's dream. And her story is far from over: with every performance, she continues to write a new chapter in the history of Ukrainian gymnastics.




Second European Cup stage added

Not only in Baku this time, but also with a second stage hosted in the Bulgarian coastal town of Burgas. And the 'Cross Battles' format that successfully launched for senior individuals last year was extended to the senior groups. A success all-around!

Mixed Team final

History was written in Leipzig as the Mixed Team Final made its European Championships debut. In fact, this format was introduced at a major international event for the very first time, gearing up to its Olympic introduction at LA28.

Over 4 rounds, the medal winners were decided. In round one, 16 teams of one female and one male athlete performed one routine each on the apparatus of their choice. The men could choose between floor, parallel bars and high

bar, and the women between vault, beam and floor. The combined scores determined the eight teams advancing to round two where they competed another routine, on a different apparatus. Then, the top four had to compete on the remaining apparatus. Teams ranked 3 and 4 faced each other in the bronze medal match, while the top two went head-to-head for gold. Strategic thinking at its finest!
